

January 30: Sunrise Shelling at Dog Beach & Shell Key Preserve

January 31 Facebook: "Yes," Kathy Cycak wrote, "the trip to Pass-a Grille turned out to be chilly in the a.m., but warmed up later on. The sunrise as well as the low tide beach unveiled its beauty as thousands of colorful banded tulips appeared. Also as a treat were many ruby red channeled duck clams dotting the sand. Then onto the ferry to Shell Key Preserve which was a scenic place as well; however, by then high tide had rolled in. The key to finding the best winter shells is always getting up in the middle of the night to get to that beach at sunrise usually when low tide begins. The Early bird catches the worm, as they say."



Legend has it that in the late 1800s, a local Spanish explorer named Juan Gomez was attempting to navigate the treacherous waters of the pass between Pass-a-Grille and Shell Key. As he passed through the narrow channel, he exclaimed, "Por aqui paso a grillos" which translates in English to: "Here I pass through crickets!" in English. Over time, the name morphed into Pass-a-Grille, and the unique moniker has stuck ever since.
