#### HOW TO SANITIZE BEACH SAND

Baking in the Oven (Best for Small Batches)

## Steps:

- 1. Preheat oven to 350F
- 2. Spread sand in a thin layer on a baking sheet (lined with foil if needed).
- 3. Bake for 30-45 minutes. Stirring halfway through to heat evenly.

4. Let it cool completely before use.

Pros: Kills most bacteria, fungi, and parasites.


Boiling (Good for Medium Batches)

### Steps:

- 1. Place sand in a large pot and cover with water.
- 2. Bring to a rolling boil for at least 10-15 minutes.
- 3. Pour off the water and dry the sand completely before using.

Pros: Effective and accessible.

Caution: Handle hot sand carefully; let cool and dry completely to avoid mold growth.

WHAT ARE TIDES? "Tides are very long-period waves that move through the ocean in response to the forces exerted by the moon and sun. Tides originate in the ocean and progress toward the coastlines where they appear as the regular rise and fall of the sea surface.

When the highest part, or crest, of the wave reaches a particular location, high tide occurs; low tide corresponds to the lowest part of the wave, or its trough. The difference in height between the high tide and the low tide is called the tidal range."


- Bring water, snacks, sun protection, shell tools, and whatever you need to be comfortable.

## Beach Treasure lar




PLEASE BRING YOUR OWN BASIC CRAFT SUPPLIES SUCH AS:

## Five ESC Historic Moments and Milestones

Sharing ESC history highlights milestones and celebrates the collective efforts that have shaped our club identity over the past 30 years.





#### ON THIS DAY IN TIME

**2010** - Fifteen years ago, our membership meetings moved to the Elks Club.

**2011** - The October general membership meeting was our first Show & Tell.

2022 - Hurricane Ian (9/28) slams cat 5 winds and flooding into SWFL. Englewood was in the eye wall for 5 hours with sustained 125 mph winds. Our meeting space at the Elks Club was heavily damaged; our library was in the rubble; and Cedar Point Environmental Park also was severely damaged. ESC Shell Study pivoted to member homes and Elsie Quirk Library.

2023 - Keeping up with advances in social media our new, comprehensive website was presented to the club on Oct 23!

2024 - Tropical Storm Debby (8/5), Hurricane Helene (9/26), & Hurricane Milton (10/9) all affected us. Milton destroys the coastline from Pinellas County south to Boca Grande. Manasota Key was wiped out and the road washed out between Manasota Key and Blind Pass heschos. And Milton Pass heschos. Pass beaches. And Milton Pass, a new cút split Stump Pass State Park.
