

"ShellCrafters will provide: wood tray, wax stain, chalk paint, sealer spray, Mod Podge and shell theme art napkins. Also Twinkle lites and some beads and pearls to add to your shells. We will first use some chalk paint and some wax stain to create the look we like. Decoupage the inside with a napkin seashell pattern, along with some burlap around the side...add some of your favorite shells inside and around the front and side. Next add a strand of twinkle lites and you are ready to use for refreshments."

PEARLS OF THE MONTH Submitted by Lori Smith

Have you ever wondered why shells come in so many beautiful colors and patterns? The pigments are actually secreted by the mollusk as the shell grows! These colors can help with camouflage, temperature control, or even species identification. No two shells are ever exactly alike—each one is a tiny masterpiece of nature.

One of the most prized finds among shellers is the *Scaphella junonia*, or simply the Junonia. Its cream-colored surface decorated with rich brown spots makes it instantly recognizable.

Pearls Continued Because Junonias live in deep water and rarely wash ashore, spotting one on the beach is considered a true sheller's dream come true!

Every shell on the beach has traveled a long journey—tumbled by waves, carried by tides, and shaped by time. Studying the wear and polish of a shell can tell you how long it's been rolling in the surf or how far it's traveled. So next time you pick up a shell, remember—you're holding a small piece of ocean history!
